MINISTER'S MESSAGE

My dear friends,

It is the middle of February and this morning I enjoyed a walk along the banks of the Clyde. As I walked I listened to the song of the thrush and admired the bright yellow of the gorse, the white of the snowdrops, the just visible greening on the hawthorns and the fattening buds on the daffodils. Spring is just around the corner; the mornings and evenings are brighter as the hours of daylight lengthen. Next week will see the start of Lent, the weeks leading up to Easter, the period which takes its name from these lengthening hours of daylight. During Lent we are often encouraged to give up something as we remember the time Jesus spent in the wilderness facing temptation placed in his way by the devil. We also remember the suffering of Jesus as he walked to the cross for each one of us. He gave up his life to change our lives.

St George's is now almost two years old and hopefully soon will be given permission to call a new minister. It would have been so easy for the congregation to sit back and wait passively until that time but that has not been the case. Despite the restrictions of Covid so much that is new is going on: we now have the Connect Hub - a cafe style church held twice monthly in the Outreach Centre; there are opportunities to learn new skills again at the Outreach Centre; there is the weekly warm spaces in the Causeyside buildings and our services are now live-streamed. All of these provide St George's with the opportunity to share the Good News of Jesus Christ, to enable others to learn of the new beginnings offered by Christ.

As the hours of daylight increase so too do our energy levels, let us use this increased energy to share God's love or to use the Guild's theme - to sow wee seeds to grow big trees.

The Role of the Kirk Session

I thought as Session Clerk that it might be helpful and educational for members to have some information on the function of the Kirk Session, as I am sure that many do not really know how it operates and what its powers are.

Our church, Paisley St George's, operates under what is known in Church of Scotland as a Unitary Constitution. This means that we operate solely with a Kirk Session, and not as used to be in many churches, with a Kirk Session and Congregational Board. Under the Unitary Constitution the Kirk Session deals with all matters of the congregation whether spiritual (worship, pastoral care, etc.) or temporal (finance, maintenance, etc.) as opposed to previously where Kirk Session dealt with spiritual matters and Congregational Board dealt with temporal matters.

The Kirk Session is made up of the Moderator, usually the Minister of the Church, and Elders. Appointment of Elders to the Kirk Session is usually by recommendation from existing elders. The person is asked if they are willing to become an Elder, and then the Kirk Session approve the appointment.

The Kirk Session meets regularly, in our case about every two months unless there is something urgent to discuss. Session meetings are open to all members of the Church, although there are certain matters which must, due to the confidential nature of the discussion, be held in closed session, i.e. no person other than Elders present.

Elders are ordained for life, but can retire from active Session duties, either full time (due to age, illness, etc.) or a limited time (work commitments, illness, etc.).

Duties of an elder are first of all to attend Session meetings, and thereafter any duty allocated to them by Session. This could include for instance, being responsible for a 'district', i.e. a small number of members who they keep in contact with and deliver Communion invitations, and also being a member of a small committee, of which there are many, dealing with all aspects of Church Life.

A Kirk Session also has responsibility for

- ~ matters of discipline
- ~ admission of new members
- ~ appointing new elders
- ~ appointing a Treasurer (not necessarily an Elder),
- ~ maintaining property in accordance with all legislation and regulations,
- ~ issuing Contracts of Employment to any employee (cleaners and organist),
- ~ delegating to committees with remits.
- ~ all other matters relating to running of the Church

A Session Clerk will be appointed (not necessarily an Elder) and the duties are

- ~ orderly keeping of records including Minutes of Session meetings,
- ~ issue Extracts of Minutes as required,
- ~ deal with any other correspondence,
- ~ any other matter as directed by Session.

The format of Worship is not included in Session remit as this is solely the responsibility of the Minister, although in a well organised and run church, it would, hopefully, be decided by mutual agreement.

As can be seen from the above brief description, the work of running the Church depends very much on the cooperation of many volunteers who are willing to give their time and talents to make things happen. Much of the work is done without the knowledge of the congregation, who in many cases do not appreciate what it takes to keep the buildings in good condition, control finances, etc.

If you feel that you could contribute your own talents in any way, without the need to be an Elder, please contact me at any time.



Our boys ran in the annual Jingle Bell run at Barshaw Park and again did very well raising funds for our Company and also for our


chosen charity. It was good that the weather was kind to us – it always helps.
