UPDATE ON SAFEGUARDING

Hi I am Lesley MacKay, the new safeguarding coordinator at Paisley St Georges. I have been busy recently with new volunteers applying for PVGs. Safeguarding is particularly important as we have all been aware of some of the horror stories of grooming and other issues we have seen in the news recently. Applications are now all online and this is causing a bit of confusion, so I thought I would try to help to make this less daunting for people. Anyone wanting to work or volunteer with children or vulnerable adults must complete the necessary checks. Volunteers should not be working until the PVG is completed and they have their certificate.



Anyone wishing to obtain a PVG certificate for the church should contact me on : lesley.mackay59@gmail.com I will then send the necessary paperwork to complete. The applicant must complete an SG03 form which is the PVG form and goes directly to the Safeguarding office of the church in Edinburgh. This form is where people can disclose any relevant information or convictions if any. I do not see this form. I will send the applicant a job description to be signed and returned to me. I will send this off with a cover letter to the safeguarding office. I also need to see 3 forms of ID one having a date of birth and address on it and photograph. When the safeguarding office receives the PVG and my letters they will then send it off for approval to Disclosure Scotland to issue the certificate.

The applicant should set up a Scot account. <https://www.mygov.scot/scotaccount>

This is where your certificate will be available to view. There are no paper certificates. When your application is approved by Disclosure Scotland, they will send you an email with a link to activate your certificate on your Scot account. This is time limited you have 14 DAYS to complete, or we must start again.

Do not panic! I am here to support you and have done a bit of hand holding and got PVGs completed successfully. Any organisation in the church looking to recruit volunteers needs to take into account the time required to get the applications processed. We want to keep our elderly and young people safe, and the paperwork is a small cost to achieve this.

The Church of Scotland expects all volunteers or staff to attend a safeguarding training course within 3 months of receiving a PVG certificate. I will keep the congregation up to date with venues and dates of courses and maybe even try to have one at St Georges.

Church Decorating

Wasn't it wonderful to be able to worship again in our newly redecorated Sanctuary as we entered Advent? It was great too for us to be joined by some of our congregation who usually can't worship with us in person. There are too many folks to name them all individually, but to everyone who made the work possible a huge thank you. There are still some finishing touches to be added with a plan to repurpose the stained-glass window from the previous George Street church, in a style like the small BB window, and sited on the wall in the south transept.

Why don't you give it a try?


We meet on the first and third Tuesday every month at Glenburn Resource Centre, Donaldswood Rd from 1:30pm to 2:45pm.



OUR MONEY FOR 2025

Could we firstly explain that in all of these figures we have not included the £69,000 we spent re-decorating the Church because the money for that came from a special reserve fund which was left to us in a legacy from the late Robert Alexander. Turning to our regular running costs and income; in the final quarter of 2025 we spent £48,000 and took in £42,000. And for the year as a whole we spent £170,000 and our income was £165,000; a deficit of £5,000.

Much of the deficit was because, in the final quarter, we had one-off items. For example we spent about £4,000 on closing the Outreach Centre and didn't have the rental income - another £4,000 - from the Glasgow Rd Manse which we are selling. But we should remember that closing the Outreach Centre will save us money and the Glasgow Rd rental will eventually be replaced by investment income from the proceeds of the sale. And on a positive note we are doing well with our Hall Lets and Congregational Givings are up by an encouraging 7%. So, taking all of that into account, the Finance Team think that for 2025 we have, once again, lived within our means.

SEEDS FOR GROWTH



Great news for our Church! Our application to the Church of Scotland's Seeds for Growth Fund was successful. We have been awarded £30,000 per year for three years. This grant will help to fund an employee who will work with families and those under 40 aiming to grow both our congregation and our work with the community and also to fund a part time PA/Administrator who will support Hazel and the wider church with communication in all its forms, building on the good work already being done by several volunteers. We will keep you posted as we make appointments.

Exciting times ahead for St George's.

Outreach Centre Clearance

Now that the Outreach Centre is closed and not to be used until the ground is sold, the Insurance Company have imposed certain conditions, one of which is that all flammable material is to be removed from the buildings.

A small group has been hard at work, deciding what is to be kept and transferred to Causeyside, what is to be sold, what is to be given away, and what is to be disposed of.

Experts from CofS head office visited the buildings and provided a list of what must be kept and moved to Causeyside. This mainly related to War Memorials in any form, but also some other items which they felt were significant in the history of the original church. We have taken all on board and the property team are currently dealing with moving items such as stained-glass window panels, and War Memorial plaques.

One of the team had a contact with the local Youth with a Mission (YWAM) and after they visited the buildings, they agreed to buy some items at nominal values, and they were also given some items at no cost as a gesture. They were particularly pleased with the gift of two communion trays complete with individual wine glasses.

Some items were sent to Auction Houses to realise some cash. It was a surprise to me that old orange plastic chairs were regarded as good sellers, and whilst not getting a great amount, we sold 12 chairs for about £60. Another good seller was a marble column, about just over 1m high which fetched £180. In all, the first lot of items sent to auction raised £340. Unfortunately, all costs are subject to Auctioneers fees, but they have agreed to reduce their standard charge for a church.



An Auction House in Kinning Park Glasgow was discovered. Good sellers here have been the wooden choir seats with attached box at the side for music books. These have consistently sold for about £35 a batch of 4 seats. 6 off collection plates sold for £30. Again, all values are subject to deduction of auction house commission.

We hired a "Man and Van" to deliver the larger items to the auction house. At time of writing the sale has not been held so we do not know the results – just hope that we get enough to cover the cost of delivery!

Other things in the buildings were judged to be of no value, so a firm of Junk Removers was contracted to come in and clear all remaining items. We pay by the lorry load and credit is due to the firm for how much they can cram into their van! To date we have had two full loads removed, with at least one more required. Whilst we will not raise a vast amount of money, every little helps in trying to balance the books of the church.



My thanks go to the band of helpers who have worked hard to separate the "wheat from the chaff". It has been an object lesson in regularly clearing stuff out. All too often in churches, people put stuff away in a cupboard and several years later no one knows who it was or why it was kept.

I will not suggest starting on Causeyside building as that would mean I get the job!

Heritage Buddies *Where Buddies Rest: Stories Rise*

Heritage Buddies is a new heritage project running from January 2026 to December 2027. The project is researching the historic graveyards of Paisley and Renfrewshire and will include two graveyards associated with Paisley St George's: the Laigh Kirk (Paisley Arts Centre) on New Street and the West Relief Church, latterly Castlehead Church.

Where possible, the project aims to survey each graveyard to produce new lair plans, carry out fresh transcriptions of all headstones and monuments, photograph every memorial, research the history of each site, and explore the family histories of some of the people buried there.

A series of talks will be delivered throughout the duration of the project, and a book bringing together the findings will be published at the end. The project is Funded by Renfrewshire Councils Culture, Heritage and Events Fund.

We already have a team of over 20 volunteers and would welcome anyone else who would like to take part. More information about the project can be found at www.heritagebuddies.uk. The project is being run by Stephen Clancy, who can be contacted at info@heritagebuddies.uk.
